<u>SSRIs</u> work within 1-2 weeks ⊕Elderly—watch for low sodium ⊕Assess all for risk of GI bleeding ⊕Can stop one and start another the next day, except Paroxetine

# Learning difficulty Jo Kingston ST4 in Psychiatry

'Intellectual disability' will replace the term Learning difficulty

- With medication start low go slow
- No 2 people with LD are the same
- Concept of time is difficult as well as death / suicide
- Distinguishing feelings from thoughts is difficult

How do you assess someone with mild LD?

- Normal approach
- Simple sentences, one question at a time only!
- What do you like doing? Are you happy or sad? What makes you happy / sad?
- Easy to make assumptions—avoid!

# Evidence based teaching

## Patients in teaching Nicola Park GP and Senior Lecturer at UCL

GPs have a powerful role as broker of interactions between patients and students. Patients reported reduced empathy in consultations with students present, especially when they felt objectified. When patients felt included in treatment they felt much better **What can we do to help include both students and patients?** 

- Ask the patient is there one tip for this student to become a better doctor
- Signpost in a consultation when the consultation moves towards teaching "I'm just going to put X on the spot a bit here and ask ..."
- Ask students to sign a card to send to patients after a teaching session include some feedback from the students about how useful it was
- Teaching- planned/unplanned? patient expectations? objectify patients less!
