## Teaching Tips for Years 4 and 5

From an informal teaching evening held at 25 Belgrave Road on 17.6.10

- At your first meeting with your student: agree the boundaries, rules & responsibilities and get a contact mobile number for your student
- Ask the student to write a referral letter
- Let the student read a GP's mail so they can see the variety and questions raised
- Consider role play of telephone triage eg. practice giving a urine result to someone over the phone
- If doing telephone triage consider a double socket so that a second handset can be used easily
- Give the student the opportunity to sit on reception and experience the front line of a GP surgery for an hour or two
- Offer students the opportunity to experience extended and out of hours if possible

### Tips on Feedback Giving

From the Year2&3 GP Teacher workshop on 11.5.10

Always remember to frame feedback: 'I am going to give you some feedback now...'

#### Opening lines

- 'How do/did you feel...'
- 'Is everything ok?'
- 'How are you finding things?'
- 'How do you think it is going?'
- 'Can I help with anything?'
- 'What are you doing well?' 'What are your strong points?'

#### Useful phrases

- 'I noticed...
- 'Have you thought about...', 'What I sometimes find useful...'
- 'Have you ever been in a similar situation?'
- 'Have you ever talked to anyone else about...?'
- 'What do you find most comfortable?'
- 'When you were examining the patient you came across as...Why do you think that is?'
- 'What might make it easier for you?'
- 'How do you think the patient found that experience?'
- 'That is understandable, it is your first patient'
- 'How do you think it affects others when you are late?'
