GP teachers supervising SSCs

SSC stands for 'student selected component'. These are timetabled pieces of work students work on independently, guided by their supervisor. If students choose a GP topic they may approach a GP teacher to be their supervisor. We have a small fund to pay for GPs supervising SSCs. It is essential that you consult Primary Care first before agreeing to supervise a student's SSC project. If payment has not been agreed in advance of you agreeing to be the supervisor we will not be able to pay. Changes to undergraduate exams from Andrew Blythe

One of my recurring nightmares is that I am about to sit Finals and haven't done any revision. So I empathise with our Final year students who have to sit an increasing number of exams. At present each university in the UK that has a medical school is given autonomy to set and mark its own set of Finals. In the USA it is different; there is a national licensing exam there. At Bristol students have to sit 2 written papers (consisting of extended matching questions), an objective structured clinical examination, a data interpretation exam and a series of observed long cases. Soon our students will have to sit some extra exams: a Prescribing Skills Assessment and a Situational Judgement Test (SJT). These new exams are being run nationally by the Medical School Council. The Prescribing Skills Assessment has been created to improve the prescribing skills of Foundation Doctors. The Situational Judgement Test will be used to rank students for their application to be Foundation Doctors. General Practice has been using SJTs for some time to select doctors for Vocational Training. And before that, the FBI was using SJTs to select its agents. Where the USA leads, we follow!
